Save the Blacksmith and Carriage Shop

Part of the cultural heritage of Clifton Park is our way of life, including signs of what has changed and will continue to change with time. We are fortunate to have one of the original Blacksmith shops from the 1800s in Clifton Park. The Blacksmith and Carriage shop are a part of our heritage that must be preserved. By preserving the shop we can keep a tangible connection to our past and the life we left behind in the dust of modern technology.

Samuel Grooms was a wagon maker and blacksmith. He had a shop standing upon land owned by Francis N. Vischer. Francis N. Vischer owned the farm on the northwest corner of Grooms Road and Miller Road. By 1851, Samuel moved the wagon and blacksmith

shop to its present location just south of the Grooms Tavern and joined the two businesses together.

Chalk inscriptions, still on the walls of the wagon shop, list local marriages occurring between 1852 and 1885. Other inscriptions, both stenciled and penciled, list past patrons and storekeepers. It would appear that the building was quite a gathering place in the mid-nineteenth century. The 1871 Business Directory for Saratoga County lists Samuel Groom as proprietor of the Grooms Corners Ho-



tel, wagon and carriage manufacturer, and blacksmith. Ed Klingbeil later converted the large space above the former wagon shop and blacksmith shop into a three bedroom rental apartment. The space below was used for garage and storage.

Did you ever wonder how our great great grandparents got around? It wasn't with the automobile or as they would later call it the horseless carriage. It was with the family horse or mule and saddles or carriage. How long would it take you to get the horse out of the barn and rigged up to the carriage to go into town for groceries and dry goods? What now takes a matter of minutes with our automobiles, then may have taken hours or a good part of the day. That harness that hangs in my barn is as mysterious to me as the internet. I wonder how often it was strapped to that other member of the family that lived in the barn. It was just a hundred years ago that we depended upon our horses to get us around. Instead of a garage mechanic to change our tires and keep our cars running, you would have needed a blacksmith or wheelwright to keep your horse and carriage in fine shape. How things have changed!

Celebrating National Historic Preservation Day May 30th!

May is nationally Historic Preservation month. The Historic Preservation Commission will hold a special event on Saturday, May 30, 2015 from 11:00 am to 3:00 pm at the Historic Grooms Road Tavern. The event is open to the public and people of all ages will find the program not only interesting but informative. Admission is free.

The program throughout the day includes tours of the Tavern, demonstrations by a wood worker on making moldings, a tinsmith, who specializes in restoration and reproduction of lighting and also builds folk art pieces out of very old tinplate and informational photos of the Blacksmith Shop (not on the tours) with drawings of what the town of Clifton Park is planning for its future. In addition, John Scherer, Clifton Park Town Historian, will present a lecture as John Grooms,1790-1877, who was an innkeeper and operated a tavern on the site of Grooms Tavern, where the Town of Clifton Park was officially founded at a meeting on April 1,1828. The lecture, "This Old House: 'How to Determine a Structure's Age and History'

will investigate construction techniques, architectural styles and research sources for compiling the history of buildings including discovering information about past owners and cultural and social implications
